VE DAY 80

On 8 May 1945 a long, hard war came to an end. Most of us have parents, grandparents and even great-grandparents who lived through the 2^{nd} World War. At this time we remember their sacrifice and service and give them our enduring thanks.

In 2025 we now have 4 known living Scots Guardsmen with service during WW2

They are:

The Earl of Elgin and Kincardine – Living near Dunfermline. Served 3rd (Tank) Battalion Scots Guards. Wounded at Caumont, Normandy in July 1944.

Mr Andrew Wemyss - Living in West Fife. As at VE Day he was serving with Scots Guards Training Battalion, Pirbright.

Walter Foster – Lives Cardiff. As at VE Day he was serving with 3rd (Tank) Battalion Scots Guards.

John Murdoch – Lives Kilmarnock. On VE Day John was on Guard at Pirbright Camp. He was in training with the Guards Armoured Training Wing. Had the war continued he'd undoubtedly have joined 3rd (Tank) Battalion Scots Guards in NW Europe. Later John served with 1SG in Trieste until 1947 where there was a Border dispute with Yugoslavia. He also played football for Kilmarnock FC.



SCOTS GUARDS IN WORLD WAR 2

1st BATTALION

Based at Chelsea Barracks. London in September 1939. Apart from a short campaign in Norway from April to June 1940 the Battalion remained in London and SE England until March 1943. Thereafter it landed in Algeria and fought in the final stages of the war in North Africa in April 1943.

Landing in Italy at Anzio and enduring 6 weeks of tough fighting in January 1944 the Bn fought some difficult battles moving northwards and ended the war in Northern Italy. It then took on security duties in Trieste an area in dispute with Yugoslavia. It returned to UK in October 1947.

2nd BATTALION

When the 2^{nd} World War began in September 1939 this Battalion had already been in Egypt since 1938 on what was expected to be a routine 2 year tour of duty. It entered the desert in April 1941 and fought some hard battles until the end of the North African campaign in April 1943. The Battalion landed in Italy at Salerno in September 1943 again taking part in hard fighting.

In March 1944 the 1st & 2nd Bn's gathered at Sorrento, Italy to reorganise. Those who had joined the Battalion as replacements and served the shortest time were transferred to the 1st Battalion to remain in Italy. A reduced 2nd Battalion returned to UK. After leave they gathered at Stobs Camp, Hawick in the Scottish Borders to be brought up to strength. Those who returned to UK had served abroad for years and some were from the original 2nd Battalion who arrived in Egypt in 1938. Half the 2nd Battalion strength remained in Italy to fight with 1st Battalion. They retrained to join the final months of fighting in North West Europe.

In February 1945 the 2Nd Battalion crossed the English Channel to Holland replacing a Welsh Guards Battalion in Guards Armed Division and joined the final stages of the war in Germany. The Battalion returned to Victoria Barracks, Windsor in December 1946.

3rd BATTALION

This Battalion was formed in October 1940, in May 1941 it was announced that the Battalion would convert to armour to fight in tanks as part of a newly formed Guards Armoured Division. This came as a surprise and there was concern that the tall Guardsmen wouldn't be suited to tank warfare. The Battalion trained until mid 1944 when it landed in Normandy in July, fighting across France, Belgium, Holland and into North Germany by the end of the war in May 1945. They quickly lost their tanks in June 1945 and disbanded in February 1946. Bn manpower was already deleted by demobilisation and those remaining were posted to either 1st Bn in Trieste or 2nd Bn still in Germany.

4th BATTALION

Formed on 28 September 1941 at Wanstead by Chigwell. Due to manning requirements of the 3 Battalions above it was always realised that 4th Battalion would not fight as a complete unit but would provide reinforcements to the other Battalions. In June 1943 the first of many drafts, 4 officers and 270 men were sent to 1st Battalion. Eventually only X Company was left and the 4th Battalion was disbanded in October 1943.

5th BATTALION

It was formed in early 1940 as a Ski Battalion to fight a Russian invasion of Finland. The majority were not Scots Guardsmen but as expert skiers they became part of the Regiment. Finland capitulated to the Russians and the Battalion was disbanded by mid-March 1940.

TRAINING BATTALION

The Training Battalion was formed on 1 September 1939 at Pirbright, Surrey to train civilians to become Guardsmen and thereafter provide reinforcements to the operational fighting Battalions. Hard and realistic training for active service was provided at a Battalion Battle Camp near Caernarvon, North Wales. The Training Battalion was disbanded in July 1946.

HOLDING BATTALION

This Battalion was formed at end April 1940 at the Tower of London. They carried out guards on London's palaces and other important buildings. Other tasks included manning fire hoses in the blitz, it guarded Hess for 3 days before he was secured elsewhere and also provide the firing party to execute a German spy. Its main duty was to provide reinforcements to the 1st, 2nd & 3rd Battalions. From October 1942 the Battalion shrank smaller and smaller and disbanded in August 1943. The small number of men remaining formed a Scots Guards Company within the Westminster Garrison Battalion at Wellington Barracks.

S COMPANY

Formed 18 March 1944 from Scots Guardsmen at the Infantry Reinforcement Depot at Rotondi, Italy. It retained its own Regimental identity and fought in a number of fierce battles as part of 2nd Battalion Coldstream Guards. Forming a part of this Coldstream Battalion was always to be a temporary arrangement to help them resolve their manning difficulties. In March 1945 the Company was withdrawn from the Coldstream and in entirety became B Company, 1st Battalion Scots Guards for the final battles in Italy.

X COMPANY

The only surviving company of 4th Battalion it was the first Scots Guards unit to land in France in June 1944. It was attached to 3rd Battalion Irish Guards then later 1st Battalion Welsh Guards as an infantry element of Guards Armed Division. X Company was disbanded in Germany on 18 March 1945 just before the end of the war and the Guardsmen reinforced the 2nd Battalion.

CASUALTIES

The Scots Guards casualties during the period of World War 2 were:

AT WAR END

Regular soldiers continued their service.

Hostilities Only Soldiers:

Most servicemen were to be released according to their 'age-and-service number', which, as its name suggests, was calculated from their age and the months they had served in uniform. A small number of so-called 'key men' whose occupational skills were vital to postwar reconstruction were to be released ahead of their turn.

The release process began about six weeks after VE Day. Decommissioned soldiers received a one-time grant of £83 each, the promise of a right to return to their old jobs, and a set of civilian clothing. The so called demob suit which included shirts, underclothes, raincoats, hat, and shoes.

At the end of 1945, demobilised soldiers reached 750,000 and this number doubled two months later after Japan's surrender. By 1947, about 4.3 million men and women returned to 'Civvy Street' to rebuild the country & get on with their lives.

Scots Guards accolade for Eck

After almost 30 years of service as secretary of the Border branch of the Scots Guards Association, Eck Barclay was recognised at the regiment's parade in London on Sunday.

The 70-year-old was in the capital to attend the Scots Guards Remembrance Sunday service in the Guards Chapel, followed by a wreath-laying at the Cenotaph in Whitehall.

Prior to the parade being dismissed at Wellington Barracks, Eck was called out to receive his service certificate.

Also well known in the town as one of the halberdiers, he told the paper: "I was surprised and humbled by the award which I will treasure for the rest of my days."

Joining the Scots Guards in 1972, he served seven years,

including three of them in Germany, as well as two tours in Northern Ireland in 1973 and 1975.

Eck was part of the regiment's Spearhead Battalion that accompanied the late Queen Elizabeth to Northern Ireland as part of the monarch's silver jubilee celebrations in 1977.

He was also one of the bearskin-headed guardsmen in The Mall for the Trooping the Colour Parade that year. It was good to see a big contingent of the 1st Battalion at Black Sunday. An early start from Catterick and a return journey late afternoon



We have been made aware that every year some 2,000 deferred Armed Forces pensions go unclaimed and the sums involved can be significant. The latest MoD report states at least 14,800 pension benefits remain unclaimed.

The pension is **NOT** paid automatically – Veterans must apply to Veterans UK using **AFPS Form 8** or call **0800 085 3600** for further information. <u>https://forcespensionsociety.org/unclaimedpensions/</u>

SCOTS GUARDS MEMORIAL PROJECT

A reminder that the Scots Guards Memorial Project is live on the Scots Guards website <u>https://scotsguards.org/history/the-memo-rial-project/#</u>, it is fairly easy to use. As part of the work of the Regimental Historical Committee the project was tasked with setting up a computer database to record memorials across the World that have been constructed to remember Scots Guardsmen in both war and peace. To date we currently have 380 Memorials listed and 927 Scots Guardsmen. We are looking for:

- Large or small memorials to single Scots Guardsmen, detachments or Battalions, from times long past until the present day.
- The memorial could be anything from plaques to stained glass windows in churches, to trees of remembrance, in fact anything which in the respectful memory of our officers or Guardsmen.
- The names of Scots Guardsmen killed and listed on local town or village war memorials.
- Headstones of graves in UK or abroad which record service in the Scots Guards, but please not those men buried in Commonwealth War Graves Commission Cemeteries because they are listed comprehensively by that organisation.
