

BITS & PIECES

The Army Operational Legacy Branch

The Army Operational Legacy Branch (AOLB) was established to support investigations, inquests and inquiries into past operations such as Op BANNER, Op TELIC and Op HERRICK. One of AOLB's fundamental roles is to provide welfare support to any veteran who has become involved in the legal process related to a legacy operation, and currently, AOLB supports over 60 Northern Ireland (Op BANNER) veterans due to a wider effort to address the legacy of 'the Troubles'.

For many veterans the first thing they know about their involvement in this process is when they receive a letter from the coroner or a phone call from the MoD's Directorate of Judicial Engagement Policy (DJEP) informing them that they are required to give evidence. This can be a protracted and stressful process so AOLB's Veteran Visiting Officers (VVOs) are here to help.

The VVOs are fulltime reservist captains with a wealth of experience: they understand the legacy processes; have a background of service on operations and possess significant experience in welfare support. The VVOs provide 'End to End' support to the veteran to explain and support them throughout the process. This includes assessing the needs of each individual and referring them to other specialist welfare organisations where necessary. The VVO support includes regular home visits and 'check-ins' to reassure and guide the veteran through the legacy process; coordination of any broader welfare or administrative support they may require; as well as matters such as accompanying them to give evidence in court where necessary. Throughout the process, the VVOs work closely with the Regimental Headquarters / Regimental Associations to ensure there is a strong network of pastoral support in place so that the longer term needs of the veteran are also captured and met beyond the duration of the legacy process.

Legal Support. Free legal support is available to all serving personnel and veterans being investigated or prosecuted for allegations relating to legacy operations, however, this is coordinated and arranged through DJEP. **AOLB does not provide legal support or advice but can help you to make contact with DJEP if you are unsure how to do so.**

Scots Guards Club - Autumn News

The Club has enjoyed a busy late summer period and looking at the coming weeks and months, the function room diary is filling up nicely, particularly into December. So if you are planning that festive event, please get in touch soon to avoid disappointment.

A busy Autumn beckons with four rugby internationals. As ever, we appreciate the patience and understanding of members in putting up with the disruption. To the Club, these days are helpful financially and in rugby terms, the Club has become a bit of an institution on match days.

Frustratingly, the match against New Zealand is a 2.30pm KO on 13 November, which is Remembrance Sunday! We will open early that day to facilitate those picking up wreaths from the Club and attending the service across the road. We will only open to the wider public after the Remembrance Service is finished.

Many of you have asked whether the piping knockouts will start again and the answer is 'yes. The plan had been to kick off again where the semi-finals left off in March 2020 (a date we wont forget!) but pipers' diary commitments are making that plan difficult to deliver. It is hoped therefore to run a recital in the Autumn and then recommence the semis in the new year.

Staying on the subject of piping, the Club plays host every fortnight to The Eagle Pipers, a long established Edinburgh piping society. The Eagles recently held a competition for the composition of a Pibroch and honoured us by naming one of the winning tunes 'The Scots Guards Club'

Our bar prices today are the same as they were in 2015! Since then we have absorbed annual wholesale cost increases thanks to all you lovely members who keep the Club busy. Having been hit with two significant increases this year alone, we have no option but to pop our prices up a bit to ensure the Club remains profitable. This increase took effect from Monday 3 October.

On a similar note, the current membership prices of £20/£15 are less than they were in 2015 when they were £30 and £25. 2023 memberships will rise to £25 and £20 (over 65). Still less than they were seven years ago and members' discount on all drinks will continue to apply. Regrettably, we will no longer be issuing couples memberships.

Any new member joining from 3 October will pay the new membership price but will receive a 2023 membership card, with membership effective immediately. So, in effect, three months membership at no cost.

Previous newsletters spoke about the ongoing conversion of the top floor of the Club from a flat to Club rooms with work anticipated to complete this year. We have however postponed this work until we have a clear understanding of electricity costs over the winter.

Many will have been moved by the lone piper fading into the distance as HM The Queen was interred at Windsor Castle following the State Funeral. What many will nor know is that the tune played was composed by our very own Chairman, Pipe Major Jimmy Banks MBE in memory of his late brother Willie who, following his time in the Scots Guards, worked for the Royal Household and who was very highly regarded by Her Majesty. Like all the music, the tune 'Royal Fendersmith' was agreed by The Queen in advance and what a magnificent thing it was that Jimmy's tune was requested by her for that final, poignant, moment.

We hope to see many of you over the coming weeks and as ever, we appreciate every single one of you who supports the Club.

Memorial to 3rd (Tank) Battalion Scots Guards ~ By Colin Foster

Readers will, I am sure recall that, in July 2019, with the extensive and enthusiastic support (both financial and personal) of the survivors, widows and descendants of those who had served in 3rd (Tank) Battalion Scots Guards between 1943 and 1945 together with donations by branches of the Scots Guards Association, and a substantial grant from the Musée de La Percée du Bocage in St Martin des Besaces, enabled us to embark on an ambitious programme of commemoration to coincide with the weekend of the 75th anniversary of the Battle. This culminated in the erection of a substantial new Memorial to the achievements of 3rd (Tank) Battalion Scots Guards in late July 1944 as one of the leading units of Operation BLUECOAT.



You will, I am sure, be pleased to read that the memorial that we erected in 2019 for the 75th Anniversary of the LES LOGES battle still looks as imposing as ever – in fact even more so now that it has had some time to "bed in". The wife of the mayor of LES LOGES ensures that there are flowers on the memorial all year round and it is clear to see that they are still very proud of "their" piece of history.

During the Pandemic, only small services were able to be held at the site due to Social Distancing, however, this year there was a much larger attendance which I was able to also attend.

At the ceremony, Billy Leblond (president of the Musée de La Percée du Bocage) read out a short dedication in both French and English as follows...

Dear friends,

Thank you for your present presence at this ceremony at Les Loges on hill 226.

For three years it was difficult to travel and attend this ceremony. This year we are happy to see the return of many families to Normandy to meditate on the places where their loved ones fought for our freedom.

We are gathered this morning to commemorate the memory of the young and courageous men who gave their lives in the hope of a better world.

On the morning of July 30, 1944, Operation Bluecoat was launched, the 6th Guards Tank Brigade set off to attack its objectives. Hill 226, where we are is devoted to the 3rd Battalion Scots Guards who lost in this action 11 tanks and 24 of their men. It is in the memory of these men and the tragedy that happened here that in 2019 this Memorial and Orientation Table was inaugurated so that we do not forget their sacrifice, and that they can thus continue to live in our memories.

Since the inauguration this place has become a key location in our tours of the battlefield.

We thank Colin Foster, Stéphane Jaquet, Mark Kentell, Jean & Jeanette Ménard, Joël Levert, his wife Maryvonne who puts flowers on this memorial as well as all the contributors and especially those of the families of those who fought and died in this battle **We will never forget**

As Billy mentioned in his dedication, the Memorial and Orientation Table are now key elements in visits by school-children to the museum as, in addition to being a safe, off-road area, the view over the battlefield (together with the details that are on the Orientation Table) make an explanation of the battle and a discussion of the terrain involved and the achievements of the Battalion a much more straightforward process.
